From the Pastor

The Lenten Season at Resurrection has been special for all of us. We got off to a good start Ash Wednesday with the largest attendance ever for such a service. Attendance has remained good for the midweek



services. We use "Road Signs Along the Lenten Journey" complete with road signs, as our theme along with the Holden Evening Prayer. Sunday morning attendance has also been good.

Soon we will enter into Holy Week on April 17th with Palm Sunday, commemorating the last earthly week of Jesus Christ as he entered Jerusalem for the last time to, according to Matthew 16:21, "Undergo great suffering…and be killed, and on the third day be raised." On Maundy Thursday, April 21, we will move on to the Upper Room as we commemorate the institution of Holy Communion. We will remember the death of our Lord on Good Friday, "to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself", according to Hebrews 9:26.

No Holy Day or festival in the Christian year can compare in importance with Easter Sunday. That Jesus Christ was resurrected after having suffered and died, is the belief most central to the Christian faith. 1 Peter 1:3 tells us, "By his great mercy God has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." A beautiful Easter Vigil at sunrise begins the day, followed by Easter Breakfast and moving on to an egg hunt for the children. The climax of Easter morning will be the festive worship service at 10:00 AM

Altar Guild News



The Altar Guild's overall function is to prepare our church for worship. This effort keeps the members busy. Likely you have noticed the deep purple paraments

and drape in the open cross for Lent and recall beautiful Christmas decorations. Look for paraments colors to change with Good Friday and Easter. These are part of Altar Guild's work. Among Altar Guild responsibilities are: training of acolytes and crucifers, setting and clearing the table, decorating communion the church appropriately for each season, keeping an inventory of wine, bread, communion wafers, making baptismal banners, supplying special items such as ashes, oil and bowls for administering ashes on Ash Wednesday, towels and basins for the foot washing ceremony, care of the baptismal font and candles.

Candles are a big part of Altar Guild's responsibilities. During various church seasons, in addition to altar candles, extra candles are in use especially during Christmas and Good Friday Recently Altar Guild has been busy services. changing from wax to liquid wax candles, this to avoid the wax dripping, ease of maintenance, as well as long term reduced expense. Liquid wax altar candles have been in use for some time---HAVE YOU NOTICED? Recently, Altar Guild purchased four liquid wax candles for the Advent wreath, and WELCA purchased the Christ Candle which is placed in the middle of the wreath. Don Meserve has adapted the Advent wreath so the five new candles fit securely and the centered Christ candle sits highest. A liquid wax Pascal candle has been donated by Candy Saxton for our sanctuary. You will see it during our Easter celebration.

Many thanks to Candy Saxton, Don Meserve and our Altar Guild for their service and generosity. A lot goes on behind the scenes in our church which we trust will facilitate a meaningful worship service.

The 'Rest of the story' from Tim Am I done?

Donna only has known me for 35 years. Well, maybe that's long enough. Actually, I suppose that's quite a while.

The short version of pre-Donna years:

Three sisters and two brothers; Dad was an LCMS pastor (as were his brother and his father); Mom was the daughter of an AAL Insurance salesman. As the oldest boy, I was "destined" to become a pastor. Mom and Dad were divorced when I was 9. That's another story. I figured *I was done*.

High School in Overland Park was a blast. Involved in choir, speech and drama, did pretty well in math and science, and went to church a lot (you guessed it – LCMS). Right after graduation went to Johnson County Community College (I think it's first year in existence) to take pre-engineering courses, but wasn't ready for the calculus. After bombing calculus and chemistry very badly, I started taking humanities courses, spent two years at a LCMS teachers' college in Seward, NE, then got in the middle of the SEMINEX debacle. *I was done*.

So, off to find my niche, I was a carpenter/remodeler/painter, made some money acting, assembled roller skates, waited tables, painted houses, made a little money as a mechanic, and in the middle of all this connected with old high school and church friends and started a bluegrass band. To keep food on the table, I worked as a surveyor, then ended up at a large firm across the street from a bank where Donna was a teller. And that's the end of the Pre-Donna years. We will have been married for 34 years on April 16. Obviously, she's a big part of life. THE biggest part of life.

Life with Donna

How we ended up in Wichita is another long story – but I think that God had a hand in it. Soon after moving here I was told that I had lupus. We had no family, no friends outside work, and I wondered just what God had in mind. I think God wanted to get my attention.

He told me to be quiet and listen. *Remember I said that <u>I was "done"</u> after the stuff at Seward? I was wrong.* It didn't happen overnight. We'd always been active in the church (switched to ELCA when living in

Arizona – another long story), and as the kids grew into their teen years that intensified. There was a growing dissatisfaction with engineering – not because it is boring or anything, it just started to feel like clothes that don't fit. I like the work, and it helps people manage their lives better. But the nagging suspicion that God might have something else in mind started keeping me awake at night.



Then people at church and at work asked me if I'd ever thought about becoming a pastor. <u>NO!! Run Away!!</u> Well, OK. I'll pray about this a bit. And listen. And watch. And listen. About the time I was figuring this is an impossible thing to do, (maybe I thought I was calling God's bluff) Pastor Hallstrom, yes, the same one, told me that Luther Seminary had started a program the year before.

This was too weird. Nope. <u>*I wasn't done.*</u> Time to take a step. The entrance process, getting accepted to Luther, being in the 2^{nd} "Cohort" of the Distributed Learning Program (which just this year has become a permanent part of Luther's program) has been a quite a "ride" so far. I expect that it will continue to be just that. Kind of scary, and sometimes challenges a person's trust in God to carry us

through the changes. But we've been blessed so much by supportive people at my work (who let me off for the occasional meeting here at Resurrection, and let me change schedules when I took a course at Wesley Medical Center), the classmates and profs at the seminary, you who are teaching me here at Resurrection, and the pastors and people at my home congregation of Reformation. And my family, both nuclear and extended, but mostly, Donna.

A few years ago my youngest sister had me memorize Proverbs 3:5-6 "*Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; acknowledge Him in all your ways, and He will direct your path.*" That verse stays here in the noggin, helping Donna and me to work through the odd things that interrupt life and seem to be "trouble." But they're not trouble in the end. <u>We're not done yet!</u>

Easter Around the World

Of all the symbols associated with Easter the egg, the symbol of fertility and new life, is the most identifiable. The customs and traditions of using eggs



have been associated with Easter for centuries.



Different cultures have developed their own ways of decorating Easter eggs. Crimson eggs, to honor the blood of Christ, are exchanged

in Greece. In parts of Germany and Austria green eggs are used on Maundy Thursday (Holy Thursday). Slavic peoples decorate their eggs in special patterns of gold and silver.

In Germany and other countries eggs used for cooking were not broken, but the contents were removed by piercing the end of each egg with a needle and blowing the contents into a bowl. The hollow eggs were died and



hung from shrubs and trees during the Easter Week. The Armenians would decorate hollow eggs with pictures of Christ, the Virgin Mary, and other religious designs.

For thousands of years, people thought of eggs as the symbols of new life. People also thought that the Earth itself hatched from a huge egg. So that is why the egg was chosen as the symbol of the resurrection.

Long before Jesus, people used to give each other eggs as presents. Every country has its own customs. In the Northern counties of England the children go around begging for eggs and other presents and acting out the Pace egg Play. In Poland girls used to send eggs to their favorite boyfriends.
