Elizabeth is a native of South Windsor Connecticut, graduating from the University of Connecticut with a BA in Psychology in 2002. She went on to receive her Master of Divinity at Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg in 2010.

Although Resurrection is Elizabeth's first call as an ordained pastor, she has several years of experience behind her. Elizabeth

served as a vicar at Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church in Seattle; this is a large, inner city church. Following Seminary school, Elizabeth served as Interim Seminarian for Learning and Worship at Luther Church of the Abiding Presence in Burke, Virginia.

Elizabeth, along with her husband, Rory Cummings, will be right here in our midst, as they are currently buying a house in Haysville. We are excited to welcome the newlywed couple, who were married on May 21st, 2011 into our community. Elizabeth gave both the sermon and children's sermon for us on June 12th. We are looking forward to this new chapter for Resurrection, as Elizabeth will begin her duties as our eighth pastor on Monday, August 15th, 2011. Join us in welcoming this coastal girl to the Heartland!

Elizabeth was ordained by our Bishop Gerald Mansholt at her home church, Emmanuel Lutheran in Hartford Connecticut on July 17th of this year. Resurrection members showered her with cards, sending them to her home in Gettysburg, to celebrate the ordination. Cards were designed by church members and featured the new stained glass windows.



Resurrection Reaches Out

program. The HCO maintains a pantry with non-perishable foods for local families. Resurrection also collects goods for HCO each Sunday when children from the congregation wheel the 'Little Red Wagon' through the aisles during the receiving of the offering.

Resurrection also gave \$800 to the Wichita Episcopal Social Services. In 2010 ESS helped 1500+ unemployed people, 300 clients with mental illness, 400 at-risk youth and served 24,893 hot lunches. The funds were Lenten offerings and matching money through Thrivent for Lutherans.

In lieu of Easter lilies this year, Resurrection offered honoraria and memorials of over \$400 to the ELCA Good Gifts program. Our national ELCA Bishop, Rev. Mark Hanson, acknowledged our gifts with thanks and told us they were distributed to aid programs in agricultural development, World Hunger, God's Global Barnyard and the ELCA Malaria Campaign.

This month WELCA gave an additional \$100 to the ELCA Malaria Campaign which provides mosquito netting for malaria prevention.

Spot Light on: Robert Nunn



Who's that? If you think you haven't seen Robert in Sunday worship much, you would be right! Captain Nunn is a pilot for Southwest Airlines and is perhaps closer to God on most Sundays as he flies. Missing Sunday worship led Robert to organize and now oversee each 2nd Wednesday mid-week communion service. He was elected to church council this year. Robert is a person with many interests, pursuing them with energy.

Robert, eldest with 2 sisters, was born in Lincoln, KS – a city of over 1000 folks on a paved road, but lived then in Vesper, KS – on an unpaved road, population: 62. He has fond childhood memories of helping his Grampa and Dad on their farm raising pigs, driving tractor. Robert's Dad and grandparents are buried in the Vesper Cemetery, "Where I'll probably be laid to rest, it's a peaceful place." At age 10, the family moved to Lincoln. Robert still worked on farms and drove tractors, but in the big town, he also shined shoes in

the barbershop, cleaned the movie theater and at age 14 was promoted to projection operator. Fond memories include a pharmacy with a soda fountain, reading comics with a malt or float. Sometimes as a treat, he still drops cashew nuts into a soda to create a chewy drink. On weekends he helped in the gas station where he worked on cars, soon realizing a gift of mechanical know-how. He also worked for the Lincoln Co. Hwy. Dept. driving trucks and heavy equipment. Now, asked about a hobby, Robert named cars, classic cars, most especially '70 –'73 Camaros.

In Lincoln, the Nunn family attended the Presbyterian Church and later Robert was confirmed at St Paul Lutheran Church. Despite having enough credits to graduate High School early, his principal said he 'was not college material'. Being a determined person, Robert graduated from then Kansas Technical Institute with a degree in civil engineering, "Don't know how I did that, I struggle with math!" In 1980, he came to work at the Sedgwick Co. Public Works Dept. At a social club in Wichita, he met a beautiful girl named Vicki whom he married 2 years later. Interested in body building, in 1985, Robert won the title "Mr. Wichita"!

When did flying an airplane become an interest? Thinking back, Robert said, "Maybe I was always meant to fly. As a kid, I always loved to climb trees. Once I dove off a building wearing the Super Man costume that my mom made for me." Resurrection is happy that God saved him! In '87 Robert took flying lessons with the Salina Flying club, moving quickly through the ratings to become a flight instructor. In '89 he flew commuter routes for Mesa, and joined Southwest Airlines in '96 where he has served as captain for 10 years. He says he has no fears as pilot, "It's too busy during an emergency. I might worry afterward."

Robert & Vicki have been married 25 years, have two sons, Robby and Nick and a dog, Max. He does BBQ and most enjoys steak and corn on the cob. He would like to live out in the country, and travel to see more closely the beautiful land he sees from 30,000 feet. When he reads its mostly work related or car stuff. The exception is daily scripture reading. Looking to the future, Robert incorporates his favorite Bible verse, John 14:6 "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." He trusts God to take him where he should be. He trusts that as a parent he has guided his sons to help others and let God lead them. Seminarian Tim Meyer Reflects

Wow – what an opportunity. Both to be among you for almost 3 years(!) and to be asked to give a word or two. (you should know better by now than to ask for "a word or two" – it will turn into a lot more than that!!)



Two of the questions that the Imaging Committee asked were "what did I like," and "what did I hate?" That second question doesn't have an answer, except that I hated missing out on the day-to-day goings on, and that I had time commitments that kept me from getting to know all of you better.

Trying to lay out what I've loved about my time with you is hard to nail down as well, but for the opposite reason. But I'll try to give just a handful of the many joys that come to mind.

Most of my time with you has been on Sunday mornings – for reasons I've already groused about. But what experiences those Sundays have offered!! It's been varied to say the least – and I think very full. That there are differences among Pr. Leaf, Pr. Hallstrom, and Pr. Cross is pretty apparent, but each of them has had very important pieces bits of wisdom and understanding to pass along, and has encouraged different experiences with you. While I'm deeply grateful for having been able to get to know each of them and watch them be with you, the key to the persistent joy has been the tangible presence of Christ among all the saints at Resurrection.

Helping with worship Sunday mornings has given me two really important "moments" week in and week out. In some ways I regret having taken the position from you all – being the one to set the table for Communion and then to offer the Cup, (it's really important that you do this in the service as well). The communion "moments" come when I lift the cover from the poured wine and then fill the chalice. Worship is a whole-body experience. We see, hear, touch, smell, taste. The sweet smell of the sacramental wine has become a bit of an entry into deeper worship. Christ is present, and is feeding us.

A big surprise has been how the time with the younger crowd became such a special moment during worship. It still takes a bit of a stretch for me to get the Children's Sermon to fit the concrete ways that they learn, by seeing and doing, and not just hearing. They have stretched me and helped me to see myself and the whole community at RxLuth in new ways.

A similar surprise came with the First Bible classes. Parents (and maybe particularly Loretta!) were patient, supportive during that time, and I think that the Spirit planted strong faith seeds in all who were there. We got to know each other well, got to get excited about God being with us in the Word, and had a really good time. That was another stretch that will serve me well.

What I'm most "bummed" about is that I'll miss the new Sunday education sessions that will start up again in the fall. I'd been planning to walk with you through The Lutheran Course — a curriculum that could stretch out for 3 months that goes into some practical discussions about "being Lutheran" (which I think is the same as "being Christ in the world").

One reason I was so worked up about going through The Lutheran Course with you is that the Saints at Resurrection Lutheran Church have a gift for living and working with each other in spite of differences. You harbor unique combinations of traditional and non-traditional ways of living; of conservative and liberal politics; you hold together a healthy crowd of the very young, the teens and emerging adults, young families, middle-ages, and the seasoned. And you hold these differences in tension in a way that shows your love for Christ, love for God's people, and for each other. That, I think, is the special gift that you will give to Pr. Elizabeth and Rory.

Okay – I can't help but offer a little exhortation here. I'm convinced, and I hope that you become convinced, that God is served best (and you, the Body of Christ are healthiest) when you get really deep into the Word. The challenge I'll throw down is for everyone to get involved in two (yeah, I know – who has the time??) Bible Studies; one that includes your peers (like "Bad Girls of the Bible," perhaps focusing on another gender or on the

patriarchs, the upstarts, etc.) and one that includes a diverse crowd of people, that crosses some boundaries, mixing up young and old, married and single, etc. As you get lost in the Word with your sisters and brothers in Christ, you will deepen your understanding of what it means to *Live the Faith*, and it will drive you to reach even farther outside the doors Resurrection to others, and to *Lift High the Cross*.

Thank you all for the support, understanding, and the many gifts of grace. Donna, Jessie, and I will keep you in our prayers. May God's richest blessings be with you and Pastor Cummings, and on the time that you will spend serving God and each other.


