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Lenten Thoughts



Ash Wednesday, February 22nd marked the beginning of six weeks in the Lenten Season. Popular tradition suggests that Lent is a time to give

something up. Have you considered giving up chocolate or desserts? What about beer or wine? What about giving up television or even

Facebook for the season? If you are giving something up, have you considered WHY? Is your intention to deprive yourself or cause yourself some suffering for these forty days?

That is far from the point of it all. Lent is not about deprivation or suffering. Lent is about returning to God. No matter where you have been, no matter how you have lived, everyone can benefit from a time of intentional returning to God. Giving something up for Lent can be meaningful when, say, that craving for chocolate causes you to think of Jesus or offer a prayer for someone in need.

However, you might also turn this tradition upside down. What if instead of giving something up, you took something on? What if your Lenten discipline was to pray for ten minutes each day or read through a book or two of the Bible?

No matter what, hold fast to the reason you return to God in the first place. You are not trying to "get right with God." You are not trying to fix things. God is forever seeking you out. Your acts of faithfulness always come after God's acts of generosity and mercy. You return to the one who draws you near in the first place. You return to the one who claims us in baptism.

So take something on or give something up, but whatever you do, allow it daily to draw you back to the gift of baptism, to the promise of a brand new start, to Jesus For where your treasure is there your heart will be also. Matt. 6:21

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THE NAVAJO LUTHERAN MISSION



More than 50 years ago Lutheran missionaries arrived at Rock Point AZ, a remote isolated village near the Four Corners area where Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico,

and Utah meet. They were leased 5 acres of land on which to build the Mission.

Today Rock Point is a gas station and convenience store, a Laundromat and post office, high school, a Chapter House and Senior Center. 3000 people live on the land in family clans. Food and medical services are still more than 50 miles away and general shopping 115 miles away in Farmington NM. The Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission campus provides a charter school for K-6th grade for 70 children who are bused in each day, a private Christian kindergarten, Health Clinic, Wellness Center, and an ELCA congregation, the House of Prayer. The traditional moral and spiritual teachings of the Navajo culture are respected and honored.

Two ELCA pastors, Pr Lynn Hubbard and Pr Deborah Hubbard serve the Mission. Many congregations support the Mission with volunteers for VBS, contributing 2 vans and a small bus to transport students, new SPARK Bibles, student teachers, and funding.

Because they are so far from a shopping center, many day-to-day items, new and used, are provided through the Mission. Their needs list includes adult and children's quilts, children's books and toys for all ages, socks, gloves, scarves and hats, sweaters and jackets of all sizes, winter shoes of all sizes and donations toward the purchase of food baskets.

Presently RLC is collecting the Campbell's "Labels for Education" and the box top Labels for Education. Please, continue to clip these items and place them in the marked box in Fellowship Hall. If you



have good clean used clothing to donate, box these and ship to Navajo Ev Lutheran Mission, PO Box 354, Rock Point AZ 86545. Their web site www.nelm.org has more information about the mission and its work.

I've sent many boxes of used clothing and all is appreciated and acknowledged. If you have questions, please, see me. Evelyn Clark

Our camp has a long history of providing youth life-changing experiences through summer camp program. Now with the partnership of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries Association of Kansas and Nebraska Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, more camp development and program expansion is happening. Thank you so much for empowering us to continue the summer camping program and build Tomah Shinga's year-round ministry.

Youth Ministry Team

Youth Ministry Team's (YMT) goal is to coordinate meaningful educational, faith based activities and programs for all youth through grade 12. The YMT encompasses the following groups: Faith 5, Confirmation, and FAITH (Finding Answers in the Heavens) Night - which includes the youth groups: CTPTB (Church the Place to Be) for youth in 3rd-6th grades and AMPED (A Ministry Preparing Extreme Disciples) for 7th-12th grade youth.

The 2011-2012 FAITH Night theme is "Taking Root" from ELCA World Hunger. This curriculum invites the youth to envision a world without hunger and encourages them to think creatively about ways to make that vision a reality. Each third Wednesday of the month evening meeting begins with a light meal, then into the sanctuary where Pastor Elizabeth reads the evening's story, next they watch a short video, and then on to theme based games and crafts to finish out the evening.

In December the FAITH Night youth went Christmas caroling in Clearwater and had a wonderful time! RLC Youth have served the homeless on "Sandwich Saturday" in January, June and December. The December event brought the homeless inside for a traditional sitdown Christmas meal of turkey, mashed potatoes and gravy, green beans, salad, coleslaw, rolls and desserts. We provided gloves, socks and stuffed animals for the attendees, of which they were very appreciative.

YMT will sponsor fundraisers to facilitate our youth to attend the Youth Gathering being held this summer of 2012 in New Orleans, and other Youth events.

Upcoming and continuing plans include: monthly FAITH Nights on the third Wednesday of the month, parade floats, FAITH 5 events, concerts, Community Service projects (Habitat Builds, Homeless Breakfasts, Sandwich Saturdays, etc.), more youth confirmed and more youth entering the confirmation program.

Our Youth ARE the future of Resurrection!!

Spotlight on: Leo & Ruby Doll

Ruby Aurelia Krause was born on Feb. 4, 1927 in Nashville, Kansas. Her parents were Paul G. & Anna Christine (Henning) Krause. The family included 1 half-brother, 1



half-sister, 4 sisters older and 1 younger sister, Evelyn. She was baptized Feb. 20, 1927 at St. John's Lutheran Church at Nashville, KS by her father who was also her pastor. Riding school bus, Ruby attended Nashvílle Christian Day school, Isabel Elementary and graduated from Isabel High School on May 16, 1945. She was confirmed on April 28, 1940 at St. John's Church by Pastor O. L. Mueller.

Her family moved to a farm in Isabel when Ruby was 11 years old, after her dad retired from the ministry in Nashville. Always a hard worker, Ruby was responsible for milking the 11 cows before and after school. Paul, Ruby's dad, had quite a green thumb and vegetables of all sorts, watermelons and chickens were raised. The children went from house to house selling the eggs, butter and produce to help support the Ruby also drove the tractor preparing fields for the crops. years later this experience would come in guite handy when Leo and Ruby moved to 40 acres east of Clearwater, fulfilling Leo's lifelong dream of owning a farm.

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Leo's favorite Bible verse:

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. John 3:16 Leo was born at home on Feb. 1, 1927 on a farm near Ellinwood. His parents were Barney and Mary Doll. Leo is the 10th of 13 children; his father was widowed with 6 children from his first wife, Johana Robl, who died of influenza at age 27. Barely one day old, Leo was baptized in The Holy Name Roman Catholic Church, a country church at Bushton, KS on Feb. 2, 1927 by Father C. J. Braun.



Beginning in a country school, Leo either rode a horse and buggy or walked. Later, he attended Bushton and Sterling schools. Leo's parents separated when he was in 2nd grade. Mother, Mary, needed help as she could read & write English but spoke only German plus tending their many children. Leo's 2 older brothers lived with their dad to help with the farm and provide Leo's mom and children with eggs and meat. Leo and brother, Roland, stacked flour sacks in boxcars to earn money to help support their mom. Leaving high school after his junior year, Leo moved to Wichita and worked at Beech Aircraft to help the family.

During WW2, Leo's dad sold the land he owned as 6 sons went to war at the same time leaving no one to help with the farm (that made the newspaper). On his 18th birthday, Leo joined the Coast Guard. Leo recalls a very cold January spent in Brooklyn, NY for basic training, next to a school for basic engineering near Maryland, a second school in Florida, and then Leo was assigned to patrol frigate PF 102 in Boston, Mass. Following, he was assigned to Recief, Brazil. It was a small ship so it tossed a lot and seawater came over the bow. Every time Leo was on board ship (alternating every 30 days in port and at sea), seasickness occurred the first 24 hours. On the ship Leo worked in the engine room to boil & condense sea water and make fresh drinking water. Leo got back into port after his year tour, he received word his dad (Barney) was dying. The Red Cross flew him home in time to attend the funeral. Leo received an Honorable Discharge on May 9, 1946. Later Leo's 3 younger brothers joined the military during the Korean War.

Back home, Leo took an American History course at East High School to obtain his GED Certificate on June 4, 1946. With many GIs returning after the war, he worked at several short term jobs, receiving \$1/hour for his work. Later, he returned to work for Boeing for 17 years. Finally he went to work for Vulcan Chemical plant. After working a year on rotating shifts and tolerating terrible odors, he was transferred to maintenance which was on first shift and he stayed until his retirement.

When Ruby moved to Wichita she worked as an elevator operator at Hinkles. She and her sister, Evelyn, attended dance clubs; Leo would go out to the dance clubs with his brothers and sister. Shadowland is where Ruby met Leo "Jack" John Doll. They were quite a pair of dancers, Jitter Bug stars, and have continued to dance into their early 80's, dancing at all the grandkids weddings. Ruby and Leo dated for 4 years as Leo was Catholic and wanted to raise the children in his religion, not in Ruby's Lutheran Church. Finally Ruby agreed and they were married on May 12, 1951 at the priest's home. After they wed Ruby worked at the City Service

Gas Company until their 1st child was born. They raised 6 children: Lon, Vicki, Candi, Randy, Jacki and Justin. Lon and Vicki were baptized Catholic but then Ruby said she really wanted the family to attend the same church, and Leo joined the Lutheran church to honor their marriage vows. Leo has been an active member in our church and served on the building committee as well as several terms on the church council. He always encouraged family members to serve on the church council.

After Candi was born Leo & Ruby moved to the farm 5 miles east of Clearwater. Leo always wanted to live on the farm to raise his children. He felt like they never knew where their kids were in the city. Working day shift, he was able to attend the children's sporting events. He also was able to coach all of his children and many of his grandchildren in baseball/softball.

A stay-at-home mom, Ruby cooked, kept house and yard, helped farm, and mothered their 6 children. Ruby fed the family on what they grew or what Leo hunted. They ate Fet and syrup (bacon fat dripping, syrup put over toast), snow cream, frog legs, rabbit and gravy, breaded pheasant and corn meal breaded catfish from the creek. Grandchildren also remember eating yogurt mixed with cottage cheese and applesauce, "pink or chocolate" milk, and ice cream cones if they were good. Ruby always said the only vice she had in life was "enjoying eating", so she was quite disappointed when she developed diabetes at the age of 49. Pills and diet have controlled it, but now that she is in her 80's, she will enjoy 'just a bite' of Leo's daily dessert.

The family grew and Ruby tended grandchildren when parents worked. While baby-sitting, Ruby would hold "school" with the children teaching them to count and read. Whether it was a child, parent (Anna, her mother), grandchild or a stray animal, she was always the caretaker. Ruby also helped Vicki teach Sunday School at our church.


Ruby's family and friends know, and repeat to others, her many sayings that she would state when a life situation came up: "Life is what you make it", "Don't throw stones if you live in a glass house", "Treat others as you would like to be treated", "A pot shouldn't call a kettle black", "Clean your own door step before you complain of others" etc. Along with these quotes, Ruby taught the 3 R's: respect, responsibility and resourcefulness. Ruby enjoyed going to garage sales finding treasures: clothing for her children, toys or home appliances. She still gets excited when she finds a bargain for next to nothing. A sewer, Ruby has supplied her ever growing family with their personal quilts.

Working overtime at Vulcan and Boeing enabled Leo to put his extra money into land and cattle. Lon, who was a banker, helped him find some of these investments and they became partners in their land and cattle ventures to form Doll & Sons Cattle Company. He still enjoys these hobbies. Leo always liked to hunt and he taught his sons/grandsons to hunt. He always made it a priority to remember safety first and had his children take the hunter safety course before they hunted. In 1986 Leo shot a deer that made the paper for 3rd place for number of brow tines that year. He still continues to hunt with his grandsons but says the deer are getting faster or he's getting slower.

A funny story: Mom normally got us kids all ready for church but one day Dad decided to help her. So he put my shoes on me (I'm guessing I was around 3 yrs old.) After they got to church Mom looked down at my feet and Dad had put my shoes on the wrong feet! I think that was the last time Dad helped Mom! Bless her soul, she had to do it all.
