Take Note! There are opportunities available to serve your church as a council member. Seriously consider this important and vital service.




Lutherland tour

From July 6-10, 2013, Candy Saxton, my daughter Ann Mah, and I were part of a group of 27 on a Lutherland tour. Many of the group were from Wichita, but we were joined by Lutherans from Washington, Indiana, and Illinois.

We arrived in Frankfurt the morning of July 6 and were met by our tour director and bus. We spent two nights in Eisenach and visited Wartburg Castle and Bach's birthplace. This was Sunday and we worshiped at St George Kirche/Church *(below)*.



Four generations of the Bach family were organists at this church. At the Bach House, we saw an interesting collection of antique organs and pianos and enjoyed a musical presentation on these instruments. Luther spent almost a year at the Wartburg and made his translation of the New

Testament while here.

Enroute to Dresden, we visited the former concentration camp Buchenwald where between 1937 and 1945, a quarter million people were imprisoned.

The center of Dresden was destroyed in an Allied fire bombing in 1945. These buildings have been restored. This includes the Opera House, museums, and cathedrals. The Protestant Cathedral has only recently been reopened. On our way to Wittenberg, we stopped at Torgau where Katie Luther died and is buried. It was at Torgau that the Allied and Russian armies met at the Elbe River at the end of the war.

We spent five nights at Wittenberg and made day trips to Berlin, Halle, Leipzig, and Eisenach. Wittenberg is preparing for the 500th anniversary in 2017 of the posting of the 95 Theses on the Castle Church doors and so scaffolding is everywhere. The interior of the Castle Church is being renovated, but we were able to hold some services there and at the Corpus Christi Chapel which is next to the City Church/ St Mary's (*right*). Since our time in Berlin was limited, our group visited various museums on "Museum Island."

Luther was born and died at Eisleben. A new museum has been added to his birth house and added much interesting information. Luther was baptized at St Peter and Paul Church *(below)* and



the congregation has elected to focus on baptism and has redone the interior and added a bapistry in the chancel area. Luther died while

on a trip to Eisleben and his Death House Museum is across the street from St Andrew's Church where he preached his last sermon.

In Leipzig, we heard of the "Peaceful Revolution" which brought thousands into the streets and contributed to the collapse of the Communist government in East Germany. St Nicholas Church was the focal point of this movement. At St Thomas Church we attended one of the organ concerts held weekly during the summer with guest organists playing on the two organs in the church.

On our last day we traveled to Erfurt where we visited St Mary's Cathedral where Luther was ordained as an Augustinian monk.

The ELCA maintains an office in Wittenberg and they welcome requests for Luther tours. They work with Christian Tours which puts the tours together. This was my fourth visit to Wittenberg and the "Lutherstadt" area and each has been different and always fun and interesting. Ann and I made new friends, thoroughly enjoyed the company and , of course, we found time to shop and enjoy and food.

Recently our prayer team received an email from Linda with this news. On September 25, the Kogi checking team finished the final translation check of the Kogi New Testament! They thank God for His presence and enabling during each of the committee sessions and also thank us for our prayers and standing together with them in this process. HUR-RAY!! This news is indeed cause for great rejoicing and thankful prayers to God!

Perhaps you recall a newsletter article several years back about Linda, a Wycliff Bible translator who has spent most of her life working with the Kogi Tribe, a primitive society in Colombia. She has lived with the Kogis, in a mud/straw hut at first, to learn their language, develop an alphabet and a written Kogi language, then teach them to read so the Word can be brought to that people.

Through the years many prayers have been answered. Great progress has been made despite opposition in several areas. Kogi families have 'taken hold of Jesus' as they say and have been baptized in Kogi Christian churches. Kogis have written hymns. Health care has improved. Several Kogi men have graduated from college in Bogota and have returned to their villages to teach their people. As the New Testament has been translated, painstaking checks with translation teams of educated Kogis have been held to make certain that words and phrases are able to be understood by the largely primitive Kogi people. God has heard and answered our prayers and the prayers of many others for Linda, her mission and for the Kogi Christians.

Linda told us that there is still a lot of work to do on details for layout and printing. Their goal is to have the text ready for voice recording by the end of the year and then do layout in early 2014. Linda is delighted to report that "Faith Comes by Hearing" plans to record the Kogi New Testament early next year for the many illiterate Kogis and God willing, the printed and audio versions of the New Testament will be ready for distribution a year from now!

Linda has a prayer request for us: <u>Pray God will</u> <u>enable the Kogi church to prepare Kogi hearts to</u> <u>receive the published New Testament.</u> Will you join our prayer team as we pray for Linda and the Kogis?

Spot Light on Bert Kirkpatrick

Bert is currently involved in writing his auto biography with a section on ancient history. He tells of a photo of his Great Aunt Sue as a youngster sitting on the lap of the outlaw Jesse James and also that his maternal grandmother was a bootlegger.

But you want to read about Bert, and here he is. Bert was born at home in Kansas City, Missouri and added that the doctor who came to deliver him was 'in the cups'. He had a younger sister, Margaret, who died suddenly at age 25 due to an aggressive pneumonia. He has a son, 2 daughters, 9 grandchildren & 4 great-grandchildren. Bert came from an unchurched home and due to his parents' divorce bounced around as he grew up. In second grade, Bert & Margaret were sent to a boarding school, which he hated. While Margaret settled to live with their paternal grandparents, Bert shifted from living with his Mom or Dad and was relocated several times: Dubuque, Iowa, Tucumcari, New Mexico,



California, and Chicago, Illinois. When he started 8th grade he faced yet another move and change of schools, Bert opted to join his sister and then also lived with his paternal grandmother through high school.

Before he lived with his grandmother, Bert would often visit her and his sister on weekends. It was then and there that he began attending a Sunday school with Margaret. It was at a small Lutheran church which the pastor, Dr. Lack, had founded by knocking on doors inviting people to worship. At this church he was baptized and confirmed. In 8th grade, Bert was part of Ward Parkway Lutheran Church's second confirmation class and even though he began confirmation studies a bit late, Bert recalls he scored 100% on the written exam and survived a public exam. That Kansas City congregation later moved to the KS side and changed their name to *Resurrection* Lutheran Church.



Bert feels that the Holy Spirit has called him all through his life, even leading him as a boy to play at a Salvation Army playground which led to attending Sunday school. At his former church, Bert served as the senior deacon for 12 years and conducted services in the pastor's absence. On the first Sunday that he attended Haysville Resurrection, Bert sat in a back pew, wishing to remain anonymous. When lightning struck and took out the organ, there was a shocked silence. Then Bert continued singing "Praise the Lord, Let the People Rejoice" in a loud, strong voice....so much for remaining anonymous! Bert remains very active in our church, beginning by preaching even before he had officially joined. He, along with Anita Johnson and Evelyn Clark, started the present Prayer Team. He calls himself a 'pinch hitter' serving on the Altar Guild

and as an unofficial WELCA member. Bert represents our church by conducting a monthly communion service at the Haysville Health Care Center and has conducted two memorial services for residents there. He calls the residents "inmates" and joins them for dinner on occasion.

Graduating high school, received their Victor Wilson scholarship to Kansas City University or Yale! In his first semester of college he made the Dean's List, the top 10%. He elected to enter the navy though he was in love with and soon married his high school sweet heart, Vicki. In the navy, Bert

worked as a clerk and was assigned to report court martial hearings. After his Navy service, he worked for the CEI and Great Northern railroad as a stenographer and attended night school to become a court reporter. At age 28 his first court reporter job in District court was to work for Judge James V. Riddel who became a very close friend, although the judge was a Catholic and Republican and Bert is staunch Lutheran and Democrat. Later he worked for Judge Ken Kimmel, then Judge Clark V. Owens, Jr. Bert can still write 2 short hand systems and tells many stories of court reporting.

Bert loves animals----but NOT CATS! His love of horses began at age 5 when his dad bought him a Shetland pony. In 8th grade he would ride his bike to rent a horse and 'hang on the fence' to watch and learn from other's lessons. Black Jack, his present horse, came to the St Francis Day animal blessing recently. Owning several horses over the years, likely his favorite is a white saddle bred, Portia. A member of the KS Carriage & Driving Society, Bert drove Portia with varied carriages as well as riding English style, always English! Dogs? Bert spent \$100 he couldn't spare to buy his first dachshund, Frieda von Boobly, always has had doxies, presently, Dietrich, who lives with a schnauzer, Roscoe. Birds? Bert is a charter member of the KS Caged Bird Club, and has successfully bred several African Grey Parrots (a rare feat). He now has 'only' 4 canaries.

Other than family, church and animals, Bert loves to read – has read everything written by Charles Dickens, his favorite author. He gardens, speaks some Spanish, signs for hearing impaired, writes letters to military and home bound members. He has assisted 5 men after their prison release. Phew!

Bert says, "Growing up poor, I understand needs of people." He feels that one doesn't need a lot of Bible knowledge to witness for Christ and he lists three important Christian points: Be a good listener, exercise forgiveness, and see worth in others. Bert claims the Lutheran church as his home, yet states that he can be comfortable worshipping anywhere Christ is preached.
