Black Forest Poke Cake

- 1 Box Chocolate Cake mix
- 2 large eggs
- ³/₄ cup milk
- ¹/₂ cup vegetable oil
- 1 16-oz hot fudge sauce
- 1 21-oz Cherry Pie Filling
- 2 cups heavy whipping cream or whipped topping
- 1 ¼ cups powdered sugar
- 1 chocolate bar

INSTRUCTIONS: Preheat oven to 350 F. Mix first 4 ingredients well on medium speed. Bake in 9-by-13-inch pan for 20-22 minutes. Check for doneness with tooth pick inserted into cake's center. Cool 10 minutes. While cake is still warm, poke holes all over top of cake with handle of a wooden spoon. Heat hot fudge sauce in microwave for about 30 -60 seconds until you can stir and thin it out. Pour sauce over cake to absorb. Cool completely. Pour fruit filling over cake, spread evenly. To prepare whipped cream, put bowl and whisk attachment in freezer for 5-10 minutes. In cold mixing bowl, beat cream on medium speed about 3 minutes. Add powdered sugar and increase speed to medium high. Beat until stiff peaks form. Spread whipped cream over cake. Chop chocolate bar into small pieces and sprinkle over top. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Palm Branches

Where do those palms come from? Each year we enter the sanctuary on Palm Sunday waving our palm branches, but where do

those palms come from? Early in the 2000s, environmental researchers found that churches were the primary users of palm fronds, that palm growth was declining, and that communities that harvested the palms were paid very little with most of the funds going to middlemen who sold the fronds to florists.

The question was raised, would churches support a palm market that promoted sustainable agriculture? In 2005, working with Lutheran World Relief, Eco-Palms began partnering with palm-harvesting communities in Guatemala. Resurrection was among the first group of churches using Eco-Palms. This year, sales may hit the 1 million mark! The project sends funds directly back to the local communities and also helps conserve the larger rainforest trees which shelter the types of palm fronds used on Palm Sunday. These palm trees grow near the forest floor and need the cover of larger trees.

So, <u>wave high</u> your palms on Palm Sunday; they're beautiful and eco-friendly!



I was born July 2, 1954 at Wesley Hospital in Wichita and had a small amount of red hair. When Dad came in to see me he said to mom, 'Who do you know that has red hair?' Then in walked mom's doctor with carrot red hair! (Dad does have red in his beard.) I am the 2nd child of six: Lon, Vicki, Candi, Randy, Jacki, & Justin, born to Leo & Ruby (Krause) Doll. I was baptized by Father Phillip U. Johnson on July 25, 1954 at St. Anthony Church in Wichita, KS. Dad was then a Catholic; Mom was Lutheran, her dad had been a Lutheran preacher. My Godmother was my dad's mother-Mary C. Doll. By the time Candi was born, dad had become a Lutheran. We attended Bethany Lutheran Church in Wichita, KS where I was confirmed on June 9, 1968 by Pastor Lenard A Dale. Years later we transferred to Resurrection Lutheran Church and have been members ever since. I followed my

mom's footsteps and taught Sunday school all the years my children were young. I was a Council Member at RLC from 1986-1988. In 2013 I was secretary of the Property committee. Now I'm on Imaging and Scrapbooking. I sing alto in our church choir and was very excited when in 2016, John joined choir singing bass.

In kindergarten at Linwood School I was terrified. I remember lying on floor crying, scared and wanting to go home. The next year we moved to a 40 acre farm east of Clearwater. I attended first and second grades at-Pleasant Valley School, a one room school-west of Peck, KS. Mrs. Mills taught all grades, K-8th. I loved having everyone all in the same room with just one other girl in my class. The first year the whole school had 6 children, the second year, 8 children. The last day of 2nd grade, parents played baseball with us and my very pregnant mom ran the bases. Pleasant Valley School was closed and I attended Clearwater schools for 3rd-12th grades.

Dad's dream was to have his own farm and raise cows, pigs and chickens. To boot, we also had dogs, cats, ducks, geese and horses. I fed the animals, sat at night when the pigs would give birth, gathered eggs. I didn't like causing pain to animals so I was a mess when mom would butcher chickens or dad would castrate cows or horses. My chores before the school bus came included breaking ice on the big cattle tank so they could drink. I had to clean my bedroom before any TV on Saturday. I was expected to cook a meal once a week which had to consist of a meat, potato, pasta or rice, salad and vegetable. Once in my senior year I forgot it was my turn to cook and I had a date. Mom said "You'd better hurry, you have to cook before you leave". That was the fastest meal I ever made and I didn't even stay to eat.

My maternal grandmother lived with us when she could no longer care for herself. She made the best raisin cream meringue pie I've ever eaten! I cared for her while my parents went to Lon's ball games. We played Chinese Checkers. I was 12 years old when she died and I was devastated. While taking care of my grandma I decided I wanted to be a nurse when I grew up.

I played baseball as soon as I could and played until I graduated from high school. I have played 1st & 3rd base, shortstop and outfield. My father coached me and he was tough. It didn't make any difference that the coach was my father! One time at short stop a ball bounced right in front of me, then over my head. As soon as that inning was over, dad said 'You will give a 110% in everything you do, and if you don't stop those balls, you'll sit on the bench. 'If you give 110% whether you win or lose, you've done your best, so you really did win'. I loved to play but was never as good as my brother Lon. Mom always kept score and taught me too.

After ball we would come home and have a 'Supper Breakfast' one of my favorite meals to this day: scrambled eggs, hash browns, bacon, biscuits and creamed peas!

My hard work ethic & discipline I learned from my parents. I worked right alongside my Dad and brother - moving cattle from pasture to pasture, helping dehorn, vaccinate and bale hay, usually in the heat of the day. After a day's work my dad came home and did the chores sometimes after dark. If a calf was to be born, he would check it several times during the night. For a winter birth, he would place the new born in our bathtub until it was dry and warm. Mom did everything that dad didn't: cooking, raising the kids, home care, paying and organizing the bills, care of the chickens and even mowing the lawn. Her work never stopped. One time I said "I'm tired of doing all these chores." She said "If you don't like it you can just leave and go elsewhere." So one day I put some clothes in a bandana, tied it to a stick and started walking. Mom came after me with the fly swatter and I got swatted several times. I said "You said I could leave!" She answered, "Don't you ever think of leaving again!" I was supposed be spanked one other time when playing with cousins, dad told us not to go into a deep mud hole, but we did. I saw how hard dad spanked the others, so I hid in my room for over an hour until he calmed down.

I was just 14 when I began working as a dishwasher at a small café in Haysville. Later I was a waitress at several cafés in Clearwater. My sister Candi joined me at the Steven's Café and we took turns getting the great tippers - usually 10 to 25 cents. I drove to school and my job in a family car and I still remember getting paid 75 cents an hour and then filling the family car up with gas for \$5. I had to buy tires for \$100 for that teal colored Impala. When dad sold that car, I told him I wanted my tires back, but I didn't get them

I worked in the Clearwater Nursing Home from 1972-1975. At this same time, I attended Sacred Heart College (presently Newman University) and St. Francis School of Nursing in Wichita, KS After graduation and passing the KS Nursing Board of Health exam in Topeka, KS, I was hired by St. Francis Hospital. My first job was a second shift charge nurse in the Obstetric/Gynecological ward.


On Feb. 20, 1975 I married Mike Pike from my hometown of Clearwater. I met him while I was working at the Café. He worked at the Clearwater Coop filling station and those guys would come in for tea and coffee. I was extremely shy before I married Mike. He told me I could "choose to sit at the Shrine dances by myself, cry and not talk to anyone, or get out there, talk to people and be happy". I planned and learned to begin a conversation by always asking people the same three questions. It worked! LOL I like being happy!

On Jan. 13, 1977 our first child, Chadwick Allen, was born. When I was pregnant with Chad I was on the St. Francis Hospital Christmas TV show advertising the maternity ward. Returning to work, I transferred to the Maternity Ward working as a post-partum staff nurse which later included labor, delivery and nursery. I really enjoyed teaching the new mothers how to care for themselves and their babies. I soon was teaching other nurses what I had learned and experienced. While I was working the maternity ward, Nicole Adriann (5/10/80) and Derek Ashton (9/15/84) were born. Rose Standley from KAKE TV came to our unit planning to do a special about healthy pregnancy. She asked if there was anyone who was pregnant? Well, yes, I was pregnant with Nikki. Would I consent to being in the TV special report with the birth televised? When they promised me it would be G rated and I would receive a video of it, I agreed. It was a very good experience and professionally done. They captured Nikki's first cry so well on TV.

In 1989 I began work as the School Nurse in Clearwater. My children & I were all on the same time schedule and I had a 3 minute drive to work and school. At my hiring, there was a stigma about school nurses. I was told 'Don't be sitting in your car, reading love novels and smoking'. The middle school principal added

the job of teaching 6^{th} grade health plus being the health provider for 1049 students in grades K-12. I proceeded to inform the principal, "I give 110% in my job and I don't read love novels nor have I ever smoked". Soon I was given a walkie-talkie since I was covering 4 buildings. After a semester that principal came back, apologized and stated I no longer had to teach 6^{th} grade health, that I had more than proved my worth. I convinced the school board to hire a 2^{nd} nurse to care for $6-12^{th}$ grades and I cared for Pre K-5th. I also gave out much needed hugs which were allowed back then.



In 1997 after I was divorced, my best friend, Donelle Frawley, introduced me to her ex-brother in law, John Larsen, who lived in MN. We met when I was in Minnesota preparing for our RLC youth group boundary waters trip. John was on vacation in Colorado. Donelle told him, 'Get here now, she's leaving in a couple days with the youth group'. John made it and we had a double date with Frawleys. JC told me that night I was nice, "but I don't do long distance relationships". I said that was ok. I went up to MN with Tim and Donelle for their family Christmas which John and his daughters always attended. We started dating after that and by May we were engaged. Thirteen months later we were married on June 19, 1999. I quit my school nurse job after 10 years and moved to Eden Prairie, MN to be John's wife. There at St Andrew Lutheran Church I collected some really good recipes and still use those recipes today.

In 2006 we received the devastating news that my older brother, Lon, was

diagnosed with colon cancer. That very day, we left to go see him as Lon & I were extremely close. While John and I were on our way to KS, I learned that my Mom had fallen in the hospital parking garage, lacerated her temporal artery and later had a stroke. Several weeks later I went back for a month to help care for my brother and mother. When I returned, even though John & I don't remember discussing it, I knew that I needed to move back to KS to spend time with my brother before his passing. Lon lived 18 months before losing him on Sept 17, 2007.

In 2006-2009 I obtained a job as an Occupational charge nurse at Wichita Clinic. During this time John remained home working as the general contractor for our house we were building west of Clearwater. It took 9 months to build our country home. I would go to work during the day and come home in the evening to check to make sure there was no "wasted space" and that the house was very "user friendly". Lol

From 2009 to 2012 I worked at Child Start as the nurse in charge of instructing pregnant mothers how best to care for their pregnancy, then breast feeding and medical needs of 0-3 year children. I loved this job. In 2012 my father kept calling me at work to request help and care for my mother who now had the starting phases of Alzheimer's. I took a 3 month leave of absence to determine if I should quit my job to help with my mother. Two months into it my father had a stroke. Then I knew God was telling me I was most needed to help with my parents' care. I cared for my mother for 3 years until John was diagnosed with Chronic Myelomonocystic Leukemia and Dementia. Now I needed to devote more time to John. I gradually limited my care time for mother and hired others for her care. My mother Ruby passed on Jan. 1 2016 at 8:05 AM with 4 of her children and husband at her bedside.

I have always loved being a wife and mother. I spend my time caring for and making awesome memories with my loving husband John and caring father Leo. I so enjoyed teaching the values of life: 3 R's - Resourcefulness, Respect and Responsibility & watching the children grow up and marry: Chad to Maranda

Gill, Nikki to Brian Christiansen and Derek to Tara Wyer. Now my love multiplies as 'Grammee' to our 10 amazing grandchildren, spending time with them or helping them make crafts.

John and I dreamed of taking trips and seeing all 50 states in our retirement. We purchased a 1990 5th Wheel Hitch Hiker RV on 10/29/14. This is really sad as John *loved* to drive while I really don't care for it. In 2017 the Dr. told us he needed to change John's chemotherapy drug and advised taking our next RV trip soon. Due to the rushed plans, I asked my brother Justin along to help me drive. Happily, thankfully, Justin drove the narrow, curvy, beautiful Tennessee roads and it was a very enjoyable trip. Now the new Chemotherapy treatment is working better than had been expected and we are thinking about another trip come spring.

We are enjoying life as much as we can each and every day. Besides RV trips I enjoy working in the yard and gardens -love growing veggies and flowers, also scrapbooking, crafts, sewing, re-organizing the house, record keeping and continuing to find ways to make everything in our house/yard/RV more "user friendly". I try to always have a smile on my face and remember as my mom taught me, "Something good comes out of everything!". I love our amazing friends and I LOVE GOD!
